Meet These K9 Heroes NEW to Paws of Honor!

Paws of Honor now has OVER 200 retired K9s in the Paws of Honor family! These hero dogs span 27 states, represent 75 different departments/agencies, and had over 898 veterinary visits totaling \$618,369 in 2021. I served as an Explosive Detection dog for seven years providing protection to the U.S. Department of Defense. I conducted sweeps for the 2016 Presidential Inauguration and got to travel to Hawaii! In April 2021, I was diagnosed with Inflammatory Bowel Disease and then emerging Small Cell Lymphoma. Since retirement,

I have learned to swim and enjoy going to the beach.

Hi! I'm Patrol & Explosive Detection K9 Reno!

I am an eight-year-old German Shepherd who served seven years with the U.S. Navy as a Dual-Purpose Patrol and Explosive

Detection canine. I was assigned to Naval District Washington HQ where I provided base security and anti-terrorism force protection postures for eight installations in the National Capital Region. I performed numerous missions throughout my career and was deployed to Saudi Arabia, as well as Qatar. In April 2022, I was medically retired due to joint and neurological issues of my spine, hips, and back legs. I am currently loving my newfound retired life and am told I am a sweet, gentle soul.

I was a Dual-Purpose Patrol, Explosives and Tracking dog and served the **Tampa Police Department** for eight years. During my career, I was responsible for numerous felony apprehensions.

My favorite "catch" was locating an armed robbery suspect who had robbed a Walgreens at gunpoint. I'm told I was an amazing working dog, but now I spend my time lounging around with my mom and dad.

The Unbreakable Bond: "Cobra Is My Savior!"

The bond between a handler and their dog is unbreakable. While every dog lover understands the feeling of love between a human and "man's best friend," four-legged officers and their handlers have the additional bond that comes from facing dangerous situations and having full faith and trust in one another.

When a dog is paired with a police or military officer, the partnership is intended to be a permanent one, usually lasting the dog's entire lifespan. Handlers and their dogs often train together to become a K9 team, cementing their trust in one another. And their relationship crosses every boundary: handlers and K9s live together, work together, and play together!

As you know, most of the retired Paws of Honor K9s have been adopted in retirement by their handlers. That means that together you're serving not one but two heroes at a time -- the four-legged heroes you help, as well as their handlers ... current or former law enforcement officers and military servicemembers who also served our country!

Dual Purpose Patrol & Narcotics Detection K9 Lobo

K9 Lobo served for nine years alongside his dad and best friend as a dual purpose patrol and narcotics detection K9 for the Stafford County Sheriff's Office in Virginia. He loved going to work,

running out of his kennel straight to the cruiser. Once in the cruiser, Lobo would snap his jaws close to his handler's face before shutting his door, as if to say, "Let's go, partner!" Lobo's dad reminisced, "If we deployed, I would open the trunk to get his tracking lead and harness while he spun around and around in circles until I opened his door."



Explosive Detection K9 Szimi

K9 Szimi and his partner worked for the Metropolitan Washington Airport Authority Police Department in Virginia,

traveling across the state and providing numerous sweeps and protection details for multiple U.S.

Presidents and other government leaders. K9 Szimi even met members of the Washington Nationals and Capitals following their respective championship wins! K9 Szimi is a very driven and determined pup, who loved to work and still gets excited to see his old vest.

Explosive Detection K9 Pano

K9 Pano is a Belgium Tervuren who was born in the Netherlands. He served as an Explosive Detection K9 with the **U.S. Secret Service** from 2013-2019, working hard with his mom by his



side. They loved to travel together and visited nine different countries, traveling around the world with the president and vice president.

Dual Purpose Patrol & Explosive Detection K9 Cobra

In 2009, Patrol/Explosive Detection **K9 Cobra** was assigned to her first and only handler, Ashley. Together they served in the **U.S. Navy** and deployed for 10 months to Kandahar, Afghanistan, in 2011, where they worked side by side through many scary situations. After leaving Afghanistan uninjured, both



Cobra and Ashley battled PTSD, but they got through it together, and grew even closer. Today Ashley says, "Cobra is my savior!"



FALL In Love With These K9 Heroes

7 Tips for a Safe & Happy Autumn with Your Pup

Fall is a great time for dog lovers and their canine companions to get outside and enjoy the cooler weather. Here are a few tips for enjoying a safe and happy season with your best friend!

• Mushrooms flourish in moist autumn soil, but ingesting mushrooms can be lethal for dogs and humans alike. It's best not to let dogs eat any mushrooms at all (even those that are safe for humans). And be especially alert while playing fetch; if a dog picks up a stick from the forest or a leaf pile, he could also accidentally scoop up a dangerous fungi.

- Be vigilant for parasites -- including ticks, which can still be active in temperatures as low as 44 °F (7 °C). Harvest mites also flourish in fall; the larvae of these tiny pests infect dogs by puncturing their skin and sucking their blood, leading to an itchy allergic reaction. Resultant scratching can cause fur loss, skin irritation, and inflammation. Ask your veterinarian for preventive measures, or avoid the meadows, fields, forest edges, gardens, and other damp, sunlit places where the pests flourish.
- Not only are they a popular autumn motif, but acorns are also dangerous to dogs; they are toxic, causing liver and kidney damage, and can cause an intestinal blockage if ingested.
- Some of the amazing fall foods we humans love are dangerous to our four-legged friends. Dogs should be prevented from consuming apple seeds, chocolate, grapes, and raisins -- as well as high-fat foods like turkey skin, dark meat, gravy, and ham. (A healthy alternative is pumpkin, which many dogs love!)
- Be alert to cold and damp, especially with older dogs and those with less undercoat. While movement is always a good thing, make sure they're seasonably attired, too!
- With colder temperatures you may find yourself using antifreeze -- a substance that is sweet-smelling, highly toxic, and only takes a few licks to kill a smaller dog. Store it out of reach and be alert to other places where your pup might find it, such as the parking lot at your favorite dog park.
- If you're a gardener, keep your dog out of your compost pile as you prepare the soil to put your garden "to bed." Dogs may be attracted to the smell, but compost may contain choking hazards (material that didn't fully compost), mold spores, or other dangerous toxins that can make your dog very sick. One example is mycotoxin poisoning -- caused from ingesting mold spores -- which can cause muscle tremors, seizures, and even death.

Fall & Your Best Friend: What Seasonal Autumn Changes May Mean for Your Dog

- As temperatures fall and days get shorter, your dog may experience metabolic and hormonal changes. This can lead to an increase in appetite!
- Pets may experience seasonal affective disorder (SAD) much like humans do. You may see this in neediness, aggression, or "accidents." If your dog experiences these types of behavior changes, try to combat them by getting her as much sunshine and fresh air as possible.
- Your dog's coat will most likely grow thicker as the weather cools. This will lead many to experience dry skin and/or dandruff.
- Cold weather can also make arthritis symptoms more aggressive. Unfortunately, hibernating indoors will only make things worse. Regular exercise, both inside and outside, can improve your dog's health!
- Paw pads can experience trauma, frostbite, drying, and cracking due to harsh cold weather and the salt and other chemicals used to melt snow. Washing paws and applying a paw balm after walks or donning puppy boots can help.

I served for five years as an Explosive Detection K9 with the Pennsylvania State Police. I am an eight-year-old German Wirehaired Pointer who loves carrots and chasing my ball.
