### **Meet These K9 Heroes NEW to Paws of Honor!**



#### **Explosive Detection K9 Roxie**

**K9 Roxie** dedicated over six years to the **U.S. Capitol Police** as an Explosive Detection dog. She has protected many important people on Capitol Hill and traveled to numerous events in the DC, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, and Pennsylvania areas. Roxie is enjoying retirement at home, relaxing on the couch, and she loves to go for car rides and walks.

K9 Tygo

**K9 Tygo** worked for the **Branson Police Department** in Missouri for almost six years. Tygo detained multiple wanted suspects, helped with seizing over \$40,000 in illegal drug money, and detected 11,000+ grams of illegal narcotics. On January 5, 2022, Tygo was diagnosed with congestive heart failure, leading to his final call and retirement. If it wasn't for his diagnosis, he would happily be patrolling the streets of Branson, making so many new friends!





#### K9 Kizmet

**K9 Kizmet** worked for the **Broward Sheriff's Office** in Florida for ten years. During her decade of service, Kizmet aided her handler with getting 3,600 kilograms (that's almost 8,000 POUNDS) of dangerous drugs off the streets and seizing over \$10 million! This super sniffer also found \$1.9 million hidden in a car carrier. After working long, and hard, Kizmet retired and now spends her days sleeping, wrestling with her K9 replacement, and tormenting the family chickens.

#### **Dual-Purpose Patrol & Explosive Detection K9 Vviper**

**K9** Vviper is a 13-year-old Belgian Malinois who worked for the United States Air Force from December 2009 to November 2018 as a Dual-Purpose Patrol and Explosive Detection dog. Vviper excelled at his job and deployed to Iraq, Kuwait, United Arab Emirates, and Guatemala, just to name a few. After retirement, Vviper was adopted by his handler and lived with him until his handler was stationed overseas and couldn't take him. Vviper then moved in with his grandparents, who spoil him rotten! His favorite thing to do is lay on the couch and watch TV.





#### **Explosive Detection K9 Thor**

**K9** Thor is a retired Explosive Detection dog who worked for the United States Federal Government for almost six years. Thor spent a lot of time in Afghanistan and Iraq, and even did a short trip to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia (KSA). While there, he got to sit next to a camel! K9 Thor placed first in the 2019 United States Police Canine Association (USPCA) Region 3 Competition and was invited to the National United States Police Canine Association, Inc. Competition in New York. Since retirement, Thor has become a mama's boy and follows her everywhere! He also enjoys playing with his three human sisters and cleaning up their crumbs, especially goldfish crackers and bananas.



### **Pet Tips: A Safe & Happy Summer with Your Dog**

Summer is a wonderful time for canine companions and pet lovers alike, with plenty of long lazy days and time spent outdoors. Here are a few tips for a safe and happy summer with your best friend or maybe some you find worth sharing with others!


• Be vigilant about vehicle safety. Always remember that pets are affected by heat much more quickly than humans are, and that cars heat up quickly in warmer weather, even with the windows cracked. Leaving a pet in a car for "just a minute" can have a deadly outcome.




• Be mindful of the temperature of asphalt or sand; prolonged exposure can burn dogs' sensitive paws.

- Know the signs of heat stroke, which can be deadly and requires immediate veterinary attention! Signs of heat stroke include excessive panting, drooling, dark or bright red tongue and gums, stumbling, lethargy, seizures, bloody diarrhea or vomiting, and coma. If you suspect heat stroke, seek veterinary treatment as soon as possible. You can provide some immediate treatment using cool (but not icy) water to lower your pet's temperature. If your pet showed signs of heat stroke but has been cooled and now appears fine, do not assume everything is now okay, as internal organs can be affected by extreme body temperature elevation. It is best to have a veterinarian examine your pet to check for potential health complications.
- Many foods and drinks often found at barbecues can be poisonous to dogs. Keep them away from raisins, grapes, onions, chocolate, and products with the sweetener xylitol, as well as alcoholic beverages which can cause intoxication, depression, and comas.
- Protect your dog from sunburn -- especially if he is short-haired or has pink skin and white hair -- by limiting his exposure when the sun is unusually strong. Apply sunblock to his ears and nose 30 minutes before going outside.
- If you take your pup to the beach, don't let him drink much seawater, as the salt can make him sick. Don't encourage out-of-shape dogs to run in the sand, which is difficult and can result in a pulled ligament or tendon. Be vigilant for jellyfish and sea lice. And rinse him with fresh water when you leave, as salt and other ocean minerals can damage his coat.








## **Explosive Detection K9 Cesar --**



#### **Dual Purpose Explosive Detection** & Patrol Military Working Dog Uu2 -- U.S. Navy

K9 Uu2 served as a dual purpose explosive detection and patrol military working dog for the United States Navy from June 2010 through October 2019. Uu2's overseas deployments included Honduras and the Horn of Africa. While deployed to Honduras, she participated in anti-drug trafficking

missions, preceding American and Honduran security forces to detect improvised explosive devices (IEDs) planted by the cartel. While deployed to the Horn of Africa, she performed explosives detection and physical security missions in support of Operation Enduring Freedom. K9 Uu2 also performed numerous stateside missions throughout her career, providing explosives detection, physical security, and visual deterrence for two U.S. Presidents, Secretary of Defense, Secretary of State, Diplomats, Heads of State, and Military Officials. K9 Uu2 was highly driven, eager to learn new skills, and excelled at her job. After retiring in 2019 she was adopted by her U.S. Navy handler.
